
Forest Magic: A guidebook for Little Woodland Explorers by Sarah Grindler

Scaffolding Activity

Magnifying Glasses and Bug Carriers:
Bring magnifying glasses and bug carriers to explore a nurse log or other areas of interest. Encourage the children to observe closely: What do they see? What do they notice? Provide bug carriers for safely placing insects inside to observe them up close. This activity fosters curiosity and introduces children to the small yet fascinating life forms in the forest.
